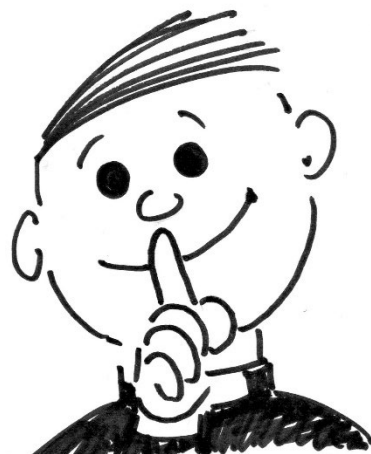
This order of service contains all you need to join in with our worship whether you are in St Anne's or joining us online –

At the War Memorials

First reading: Micah 4: 1-5

A reading from the prophet Micah.

In days to come

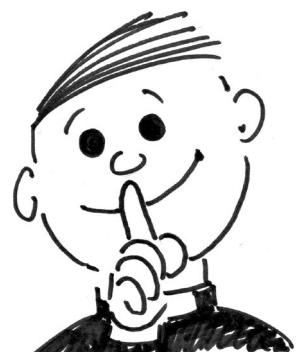
